We are excited to be able to worship indoors! And we are fully supportive of all who are not ready to gather in groups. Here are the guidelines we will be following on Sundays:

- Everyone must wear a mask
- Everyone must sign a release/waiver of responsibility (once), which is a requirement of our insurance carrier. (This has become a standard requirement in this time of COVID19.)
- Bulletins will be available for your use, or you can download one from the website.
- The restrooms will be closed.
- Pews have been cordoned off to ensure social distancing side to side and front to back.
- No indoor congregational singing is permitted.
- No-touch hand sanitizers are available in two locations.
- The collection plate will not be passed, but will be available for you to drop your offering in.
- A no-touch, self-serve Communion has resumed on the first and third Sundays of the month.

Council Highlights

- The Treasurer reports that the current balance in the General checking account is \$16,247. Income is at 77% of budget, and expenses are at 78%.
- Email addresses are now on the new Accounting system, and giving statements are ready to be mailed. A back-up person is needed to be trained on the new program, and Gary Brochtrup has volunteered
- The answering machine has been switched over to voice mail so messages can be checked daily remotely. Volunteers will be available every day to check messages.
- Endowment Committee: Endowment Fund report has been updated with current values.
- Council voted to revise the Musician's contract for the 2021 budget year to add three days sick leave and reduce the services on Christmas Eve from two to one.
- The Council voted to open the church for the first time on Sunday, October 11 with restrictions and adhering to guidelines provided by the State and County. See article on page 2 for more information.
- There is approximately \$11,000 in the Designated Fund for stained glass. A committee met with Dick William's son-in-law who is a stained glass artist with completed projects nationally. He is willing to work within our budget and is working on a design.

Outreach Committee

The two wings have been added to the little library structure and are filled with food and books for all to enjoy. Soon a prayer box will be added for people to request that we pray for them or a family member.

Coffee Club is back in the swing of things. Our first outing was at Tidelands Park in Morro Bay. It was decided to add another day so that more people can come. Coffee Club will now meet on the first Monday, and the third Friday of the month. Check the calendar on the website and join us for some lively conversation!



Pastor Robyn shared some details about the upcoming Unconscious Bias Workshop. The group talked about creating a Welcome Statement and how the interim processing Calvary's Mission Statement.

Some of the Lutheran Churches in the area are meeting to determine the best way to help Iglesia. They always need food, and gift cards for grocery stores are very helpful.

Some ideas for outreach in 2021:

- Write a "Welcome Statement",
- "Sunday Undie" collecting new

underwear and socks as well as toiletries for the homeless population,

- keeping the food and library structure full!

Bill Olson was a sought after photographer dating back to his intelligence work in World War 2, but his greatest love was nature photography. His artist's eye meant high standards and beautiful photographs. His family has acknowledged Bill's love of Calvary by donating some of his many works in order to raise funds for the church he loved. Some of the photographs will be kept and hung in the building, and some of them will be sold. Prices for the photographs are \$100 for the larger photos, and \$75 for the smaller photos. The frames are all hand made by Bill himself. A sampling of the photos is inserted above (this is just a sample and not the entire collection). The photos may be viewed in person by appointment. Bill Olson, Obituary On September 21 Calvary lost long-time member Bill Olson. Bill was a member of Calvary Lutheran Church for many years and will be remembered fondly by many. A Graveside celebration of Bill's life was held on Wednesday, October 14 at the Cayucos-Morro Bay Cemetery in Cayucos. Pastor Provis officiated and time was set aside for family and friends to share memories of Bill.

William H "Bill" Olson passed away on September 21,

2020 in Morro Bay. He was born in Muskegon, MI and was 100 years of age when he passed. In 1940, he moved to Los Angeles to attend the Art Center School of Design and His studv photography. studies, however, were interrupted by World War II. He joined the USAAF and became а Signal Corps photographer and cinematographer. He worked on many training films and filmed combat missions in the Pacific from the nose of a B-25 bomber. He also flew in the reconnaissance version of the B-29 and filmed some of the first reconnaissance missions over Japan. After the war he returned to Los Angeles where he completed his degree in photography from Art Center, using his GI benefits. In 1947, he



purchased a graphic arts business in Los Angeles and began his long career in commercial photography, first as a partnership and after 1965 as a sole proprietor. His clients included advertising agencies, architects, and a variety of companies that appreciated the high quality of his color printing, his innovations in print technology, and his meticulous attention to detail. In Los Angeles Bill met his wife Elizabeth "Betty", a registered nurse, and they were married in 1955. Shortly after their marriage they moved to Monterey Park, where they lived for 27 years. Betty provided administrative support for the business, which they operated until 1984 when Bill retired from commercial photography and they moved to Morro Bay. From their new home, Bill continued to sell photographic supplies and provide technical support to his customers. He met many friends on the Central Coast through the sales business who greatly appreciated his advice and knowledge of photography gained through 40 years of experience. Bill kept busy not only with his business but also with continuing his love of landscape and nature photography in Morro Bay, Montana de Oro Park, and surrounding area, taking many stunning pictures of the Central Coast. He volunteered for a number of years as a docent at the park, continuing this work well into his 80's. Already past 75 years of age, he taught himself to use a computer and Photoshop to edit and print digital pictures. He also served in a variety of roles to assist his adopted home town, particularly in water supply issues for the City of Morro Bay. Bill had many interests besides photography, including historical railroading, model trains, war history, classical and swing-era music, and reading. He was an active member of Calvary Lutheran Church in Morro Bay, and he regularly attended services and events at the church until age-related health problems made it difficult for him to continue. He also was a member of the VFW and an informal veteran's group that met once a week in Morro Bay to swap stories about WWII. Bill is survived by his daughter Deborah and his son Bill. His wife Betty predeceased him in 2013. The family would like to thank Casa de Flores senior residence and all the devoted staff and caregivers there for the excellent care Bill received during the last four years of his life. In lieu of flowers, the family prefers donations to be made in Bill Olson's honor to Calvary Lutheran Church in Morro Bay.
