KEEPING THE PROMISES MADE A DECADE AGO

Recently we asked about how our sister church Iglesia Luterana came to be. In 1997, some of the Lutheran pastors of the Central Coast Conference began a grassroots effort to start a new church, one that would reach the Hispanic community. Calvary Lutheran was part of that original conversation.

This effort has always been rooted in the dreams and vision of the churches on the Central Coast and was not instigated by the Synod.

When Patricia Muran (at the time a member of Saint John's Lutheran Church) announced that she would be entering PLTS to ultimately serve the Spanish speaking people, the mission church idea took hold.

So while Patricia tended to her seminary studies, the core group of pastors strategized how to find mission support and to rally the conference churches to advocate for a new church.

With much prayer, they contacted and secured financial backing from 1) local ELCA churches 2) Southwest California Synod 3) ELCA church wide ELCA office in Chicago.





In 2001, when Patricia graduated from seminary, she was ordained and called as a mission developer in Santa Maria. Her church served a very marginalized community of mostly Mexican immigrants that have minimal education, speak Spanish and a native Mayan language, and

have an indigenous culture. Many work in agriculture. The grace of Christ touched their hearts and lives and continues to do so after Patricia retired in 2016.

Pastor Esteban Salazar was called to IL Santa Cruz and currently serves there with his wife Angie. We are hoping to reinvigorate our conference around this work as we keep the promise we made to them at their founding. Last year, IL Santa Cruz presided at over 50 baptisms and 22 confirmations, by far the healthiest of all our churches. Currently they share sanctuary and office space with Bethel Lutheran Church in Santa Maria. Stay tuned.

Pastor's Pen: A Lenten Walk in the Woods

ave you found yourself saying recently, "I can't wait until we are out of the woods." I know I've said it. Many of us are wanting, and planning, for a return to life outside of the woods. 2020 and 2021 has been challenging so longing for normalcy is understandable. Our faith tells us that Jesus is with us. There is nowhere we can be where Jesus is not. However, at times like now, ours is to live where we are and not where we prefer to be. Ours is to become more aware of Jesus' presence and providence. This Lenten season, ours is to reflect again on the greatest love of our Savior.

My friend Tom Jolivette has been giving this metaphor of the woods a lot of thought. "Living in the woods is scary. It takes both a different mindset and a different skillset. Instead of trying to find our way out—back to normal—we must learn to live in our new reality." Since the day we left Eden, the people of God have been trying to make our way back to the place we most deeply belong—to the literal dust of our making and the unfathomably deep heart of God.

Journey is a common theme we witness throughout the bible. It brings to mind a quote from writer Ram Dass: "We're all just walking each other home." And so it is with the idea of Pilgrimage. We need each other. Like God whispering to Elijah on the mountain, we will come to realize that the journey is the real flesh and blood of our endeavor—to find and connect with God and our fellow pilgrims that accompany us.

It might be a more challenging life.

It might be a better life.

Therefore, I invite you into a special Lenten

Journey-a pilgrimage-to the cross. It will be a time when we'll supplement our Sunday readings with midweek devotions and discussions. Via ZOOM, we'll enjoy soup suppers in our homes, visit with each other during the




meal, and reflect on the devotion. If weather permits we may add a group walk. We hope you'll be inspired to take your own reflective walks? What wonders await? What riches will be found in intimate conversations with Christ?

Our Lenten journey begins on Ash Wednesday which is February 17th. We invite you to gather outside on our west patio at 4 PM for a brief service of reflection. We will impose ashes in the form of a temporary tattoo. Without touch, you'll receive a cross along with the ritual reminder, "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return." The significance of the cross reminds us that it is the grace that clings; that we are marked by Christ. This Lenten season we'll continue to "walk dusty" with Christ, reflecting as we journey together towards Easter hope. And no matter what, Easter always comes.

With prayers for a holy Lent, may we each remember who and whose we are.

He was a member of the Chicasaw Tribe, a Korean War Army Veteran, a Huntington Police Office, Morro Bay Police Officer and retired as a California Department of Corrections Correctional Officer at the California Mens Colony.

We are ready to distribute the survey (value voting) to get congregation wide feedback on the things they would prioritize. The survey will go out electronically later this month.

The Treasurer reports that The current balance in the Chase General Checking account is \$22,709.72 as of January 7, 2021. We had budgeted a total income of \$73,760.00 and \$73,760.00 for expenses. In reality, we received a total of \$84,896.74 in income with expenses of \$77,363.03 as of 12/31/2020.

Outreach Team Joins the Efforts in Feeding the Homeless and Food Insecure



Ten years ago a small circle of friends saw a need and stepped in to address it. Since then a growing number of others, including churches and civic groups, have rotated feeding our neighbors every Monday evening at the Morro Bay Veterans Hall. Calvary joins the circle this month, preparing meals for 60-80 individuals, assigned to one Monday every other month. This week there were 39 at Community Take-out dinner.

Because of the wind, they staged the pickup for free food and the entree inside. Guests were given masks

and gloves and shopping bags as needed. They were very grateful to be out of the wind if only for a short while. Beginning February 8, our assignment is to prepare trays of casserole style meals. A different group of volunteers packages them in individual servings, adding sides and desserts to the takeout bag. It's the community coming together for its own. Los Osos has a similar program which we will also assist.

Donations are provided by the Food Bank in partnership with the Morro Bay Lion's Club, Grocery Outlet of Los Osos, Jim Quesenberry (via donations from Ralphs and Costco), Sharon O'Leary, from the City of Morro Bay (via donations from Albertsons and elsewhere), and Spencer's Market of Morro Bay. Thank them if you see them.

Groups supplying dinner are (in alphabetical order) the Calvary Lutheran Church, Central Coast Circle of Friends, the Estero Bay Methodist Church, the Lion's Club, Morro Bay Quota, North Morro Church, St. Peter's Episcopal Church, and St. Tim's Catholic Church. Most of these lovely groups of citizens have been feeding our guests for years. Give them a big hand, too

... is not how we've done it in the past, however given our safety restrictions, we are blessed to be able to gather and see each other via this remarkable techology.

We want to thank everyone who took the time to log in to the meeting and to share their thoughts during discussions. It was a very good turn out. We were able to pass the recent updates to our constitution and we made two bylaws changes: 1) to have only one annual congregational meeting instead of two, and 2) to remove the "ex officio"

wording of our council treasurer's presence on our finance committee. We ended the meeting with two major celebrations. The first one was that, pandemic or not, we ended 2020 with a small surplus in the budget! The second was that we raised \$850 dollars to provide grocery gift cards and gifts for the families at Iglesia Luterana in Santa Maria. Finally we passed a conservative budget for 2021, putting us in a favorable position going forward.
